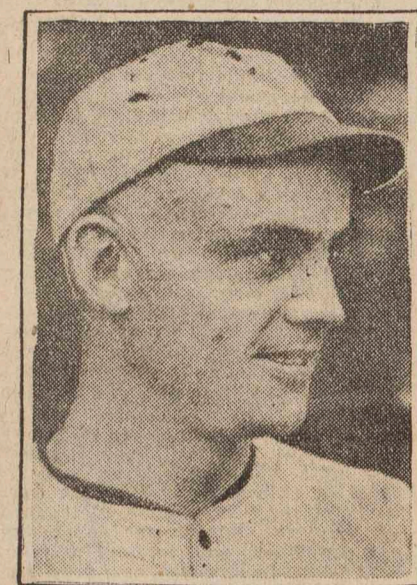

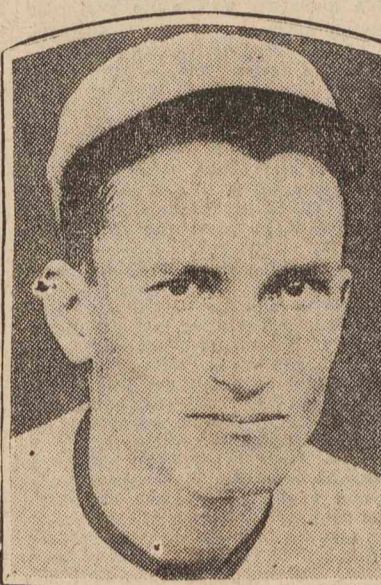

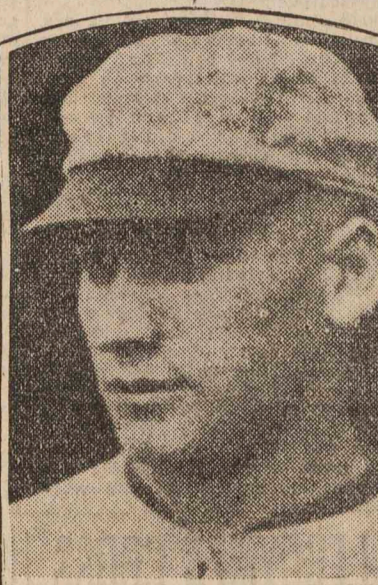

LEGION CONVENTION UPHOLDS OLD STAND ON ORGANIZED LABOR

'Strict Neutrality' Reiterated; Gen. Wood Advises Watch on Politicians

CLEVELAND, Sept. 28.—The second annual convention of the American Legion, in session here today, underwent a barrage of resolutions and committee reports, and when adjournment was taken this evening, after a nine-hour session, there were several committees to be heard, reports of which will be brought up tomorrow morning.

The stand of the legion in regard to organized labor was not mentioned in the report of the committee on resolutions. However, a minority report was submitted, which recommended "the American Legion reiterate its well-known position, that it has no participation in controversies between capital and labor. The American Legion is not opposed to organized labor when it conducts itself, as we believe it normally does, in conformity with law and order."
