It ratifies the nomination of Blaine and Logan; declares unalterable opposition to the free trade doctrines of the democratic party; says the American people are competent to control their domestic affairs, and need no lessons from a government from which they had to wrest their liberty with arms, and against whose cruisers they had to fight during the late rebellion, declares in favor of the Mource doctrine, and that an attempt of any European power to seize, fortify or control the Panama canal, or any other water across the continent, should be resisted to the utmost by every republic on the American continent; said the nomination of Cleveland was made against the interests of the Irish and industrial classes, and in an insulting manner.

If he has money left January 1st and all debts paid, he knows it has been a prosperous year with him, and if, on the contrary, there are debts to pay and nothing to pay them with, he is aware of a leak at some point, but where he cannot for the life of him tell.

Ask one of them who keep no accounts why they conduct business in that way, and the almost universal reply is, "O, I haven't time to bother with it." It would seem from this that there must be something about farming that does not require it to be conducted as any other business; still, the closest investigation fails to show any reason, but the arguments discovered in favor of keeping accounts are innumerable. There is no reason, there can be none, why every farmer should not conduct his ranch on strictly business principles, and keep a record of every cent expended and received. Take, say, a man who buys everything on the credit system, making a settlement once in three or six months, or, as in seme portions of this state, yearly. At the end of the year the money required to make those improvements so much needed in the house dairy or on the ranch is ready, and the business man has the satisfaction that comes to all who have lived within their

Take the lives of these two farmers and compare them, and it will be found that in nine cases out of ten the "business" man lives better, has more to show for his money, and is happier in every way than the "some way" man. Does it pay then to keep accounts? Let every man who does not, try it for six months, and at the end of that time he will heartily say with as that it pays not only in wealth, but in health and happiness.
